Jane had in hand the address of every McDonald's on Broadway (my only clue as to the location of the Nautilus strip.) After we emerged from the subway, Jane took one side of Broadway and I took the other. First we walked to the north to the closest McDonald's and then decided to turn around and check out the southern-most McDonald's before heading any further north. Lo and behold that was a good decision and within a few blocks south, we found them.

The Nautilus Scholarship

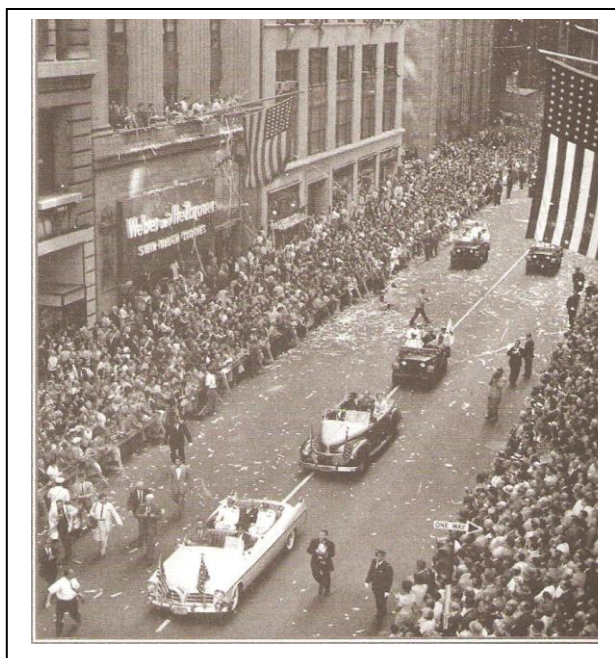

This prompted Bill to recall that when the parade began, he wasn't exactly sure what to do. Should he smile and wave during the parade or not given that "the Admiral was sitting there" very stern faced? Bill was concerned that the Admiral would "think it frivolous or not dignified" for the CO to wave or show signs of being "a hero." But soon, Bill stated, "the Admiral started waving and smiling" at the

excited, happy crowd. Bill said he took that as a sign it was okay to do the same and otherwise enjoy that glorious trip up Broadway. I am sure the sailors that followed in jeeps waved and smiled without restraint or hesitation. And, Bill's tone in recalling the event some forty years later was definitely humorous but just goes to show, the likely reality was CO's were always on guard and watching "the Admiral" -- particularly if the CO was one William R. Anderson! Δ

Assistance Fund (NEAF)/*Nautilus Scholarship* as a lasting memorial of all our departed shipmates. The *Nautilus Scholarship*, when available, is exclusive only for spouses, children, grandchildren, great grandchildren, step child, or step grand and great step grandchild of any crew member who served honorably aboard USS Nautilus SSN-571, USS Nautilus SS-168, or Historic Ship Nautilus SSN-571 for at least 30 days.

Many crew members, auxiliary members, and friends of Nautilus have already donated seed money to the NEAF in order to get the *Nautilus Scholarship* underway. (See list of donors on page 7). The monies donated goes into an escrow account, administered by DSF, and will not be paid out for scholarships, only the interest or dividends generated by the principle of the escrow will be offered as the *Nautilus Scholarship*. This will take some time before a scholarship can be offered but will make the *Nautilus Scholarship* an everlasting legacy as long as the Nautilus Alumni Association, Inc. (NAAI) exists.

Applicants for the *Nautilus Scholarship* may also apply for the *Dolphin Scholarship* provided they meet the requirements for that scholarship. The applications are different and one is needed to apply for each scholarship. It is possible that a person could receive both scholarships at the same time. The *Nautilus Scholarship* will be a one year fund. Applicants and recipients of the *Nautilus Scholarship* may reapply and compete each year for additional funding or initial funding.

It will take time for the principle to generate enough funds for the first Nautilus Scholarship. When the first scholarship is offered it will be advertised on the NAAI website and in the NAAI newsletter. I'm asking that you have patience and wait until it is posted. Please do not call the DSF. They will not be able to tell you anything more than what's posted on the website and listed in the newsletter.

As before, the amount of each *Nautilus Scholarship* will be determined by the amount of funds in the principle (NEAF). Obviously, the more funds in the escrow (NEAF) the more interest generated for the *Nautilus Scholarship*. Submarine to Space Shuttle

On February 26, 2009, at the Submarine Museum in Groton, CAPT Stephen Bowen, USN, the first submariner officer in space, gave a presentation on his recent flight to the space station. He also presented to H.S. Nautilus OIC, LCDR Greg Caskey, USN, for the museum, four items he carried into space. They are a pair of silver dolphins, a pair of gold dolphins, a gold 50th anniversary "First Transpolar Voyage" medallion and the SSN 571 flag that USS Providence had taken to the North Pole last year. All of these items will become part of a future museum display.



H.S. Nautilus XO, LT Howie Hughs, USN provided the this photo of CAPT Bowen in the shuttle with the flag. The SSN 571 flag has now been very deep at the North Pole and very far into space.

In closing, LCDR Caskey gave CAPT Bowen a Nautilus cap with scrambled eggs, a gold 50th anniversary "First Transpolar Voyage" medallion, and a Nautilus plaque commending him for adding to the submarine force's heritage and commemorating the event. Δ

BURIAL AT SEA

Burial at sea is a means of final disposition of remains that is performed on United States Navy vessels. The committal ceremony is performed while the ship is deployed. Therefore, family members are not allowed to be present. The commanding officer of the ship assigned to perform the ceremony will notify the family of the date, time, and, longitude and latitude once the committal service has been completed.

Individuals eligible for this program are: active duty members of the uniformed services; retirees and veterans who were honorably discharged; U.S. civilian marine personnel of the Military Sealift Command; and dependent family members of active duty personnel, retirees, and veterans of the uniformed services.

After the death of the individual for whom the request for Burial at Sea is being made, the Person Authorized to Direct Disposition (PADD) should print out and complete the Burial at Sea Request Form. Supporting documents which must accompany this request are: a photocopy of the death certificate; the burial transit permit or the cremation certificate; and a copy of the DD Form 214, Sea Request Form and the three supporting documents make up the Burial at Sea Request package.

A Burial Flag is required for all committal services performed aboard United States Naval vessels, except family members, who are not authorized a burial flag. Following the services at sea, the flag that accompanied the cremains will be returned to the PADD. If the PADD does not wish to send a burial flag

for the service, a flag will be provided by the Navy for the committal service, but will not be sent to the PADD. (Note: For deceased veterans, a burial flag can be provided at no charge from the Veterans Administration).

Cremains must be in an urn or plastic/metal container to prevent spillage in shipping. The cremains, along with the completed Burial at Sea Request package, and the burial flag will be forwarded to the Burial at Sea Coordinator at the desired port of embarkation. Prior to shipment, it is recommended that a phone call be made informing the coordinator of the pending request. It is also recommended that the cremains package be sent via certified mail, return receipt requested.

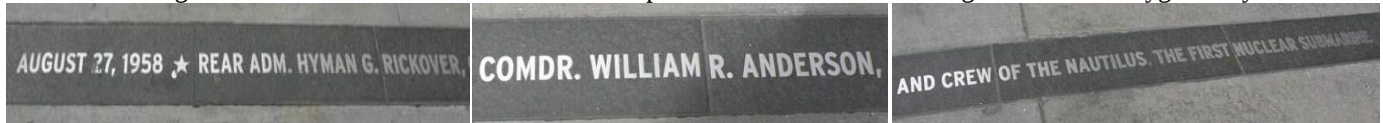
Specific guidelines are required for the preparation of casketed remains. All expenses incurred in this process are the responsibility of the PADD, who will select a funeral home in the area of the port of embarkation. After this selection has been made and notification has been provided to the coordinator, the casketed remains, the request form, supporting documents, and the burial flag are to be forwarded to the receiving funeral home.

The coordinator will make the inspection and complete the checklist for the preparation of casketed remains. It is recommended that funeral homes responsible for preparing and shipping intact remains contact Navy Mortuary Affairs at the Military Medical Support Office in Great Lakes, Ill., to receive the preparation requirements.

Note that what used to be the Westinghouse building is about 20 feet away. Appropriate, of course, since the *Nautilus* was powered by a Westinghouse reactor plant.

Bequests

Did you know that over half of all adult Americans do not have a will? Those who don’t will not receive the gratification of knowing that their generosity can create a living legacy. By planning now, you can help ensure that the Nautilus Scholarship is funded for future generations.

How can you provide for our future support? The answer is simple: by including a charitable bequest in your will or estate planning. A bequest is easy to arrange:

- It is not payable until death, so it does not affect your assets or cash flow during your lifetime.
- It is private – your will is not filed or made public until your death.
- It is revocable – you can change the provisions in your will or trust at any time until death.

A bequest can deliver a specific gift to DSF, such as “I bequeath the sum of ten thousand (\$10,000) Dollars.” Or, it can deliver a percentage of the balance remaining in your estate after taxes, expenses and other bequests have been paid, what’s known as the residue of your estate, such as “I bequeath ten percent of the residue of my estate.” Generally, giving a percentage of the residue allows for more flexibility in your long-term planning.

A charitable bequest or trust distribution is deductible for federal estate tax purposes, and there is no limit on the

deduction your estate can claim. In addition, the gift is usually exempt from state inheritance taxes. The Federal Charitable IRA Rollover provisions have been extended through 2009. If you are 70 ½ years or older, you and your spouse can each direct your IRA distribution to Dolphin Scholarship Foundation for the **Nautilus Scholarship** (up to \$100,000).

You can amend your current will or trust to make a gift to Dolphin Scholarship Foundation to be used for the Nautilus Scholarship. Your attorney can prepare a simple document, called a codicil, that adds a new bequest to DSF while reaffirming the other terms of your will. Similarly, your attorney can prepare an amendment to your revocable trust to add Dolphin Scholarship Foundation as a beneficiary.

Life Insurances

Make your donation grow fifty-fold! An insurance policy naming the **Nautilus Scholarship** and Dolphin Scholarship Foundation as the beneficiary can help you leave the **Gift of a Lifetime**. Depending on the type of policy, you can even allow money to be used for the **Nautilus Scholarship** during your lifetime.

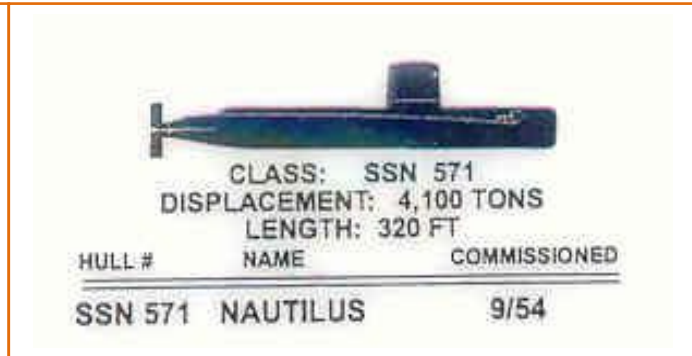
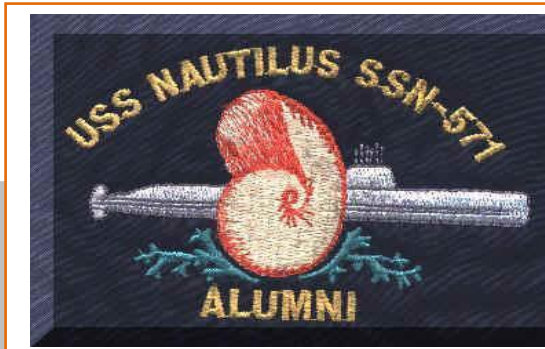
