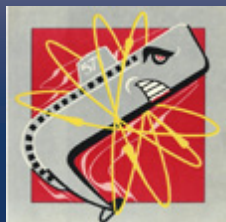

Mystic Reunion



Distinguished Submariner Vice Admiral Kenneth Monroe Carr, USN Ret., passed away November 15, 2015, at Judson Retirement Community, Cleveland, Ohio.

He was the beloved husband of the late Molly Pace Carr, his wife of 66 years, who passed away in 2014. He was born March 17, 1925 in Mayfield, Kentucky. His parents were Mr. and Mrs. Norman Carr and he was the brother of the late Nathan Carr.

VADM Kenneth M. Carr retired from the U.S. Navy on May 1, 1985, last serving as Deputy and Chief of Staff to the Commander in Chief Atlantic Command and the Commander in Chief of the U.S. Atlantic Fleet.

VADM Carr enlisted in the Navy in 1943 and served as a crewman on an assault landing craft in the Pacific theater before being selected for an officer candidate program at the University of Louisville in 1944, and being appointed to the U.S. Naval Academy as a member of the class of 1949.

In 1950, he entered submarine school in New London, Connecticut and in 1953 was

navigated under the North Pole. This expedition was not only an achievement for mankind, it was an important milestone in the Cold War.

He later served as Commanding Officer of the nuclear submarine USS FLASHER and the fleet ballistic missile nuclear submarine USS JOHN ADAMS. VADM Carr was assigned to the Office of the Chief of Naval Operations

assigned to the precommissioning detail of the nuclear submarine USS NAUTILUS. With the exception of a one-year period for nuclear power training, he served as a member of the Nautilus crew until 1960. The Nautilus was the world's first nuclear powered submarine. Ken was quoted as saying, "the Sun always shines on the Nautilus" when the clouds parted for the commissioning of the Nautilus. He was an officer on the mission that Nautilus first cross-

(Research and Development) in 1968, and to the staff of the Commander in Chief of the U.S. Atlantic Fleet in 1970, as a senior member of the Naval Nuclear Propulsion Examining Board. In 1972, VADM Carr was assigned as Chief of Staff to the Commander, Submarine Force of the U.S. Atlantic Fleet and in 1973 he assumed duties of Military Assistant to the Deputy Secretary of Defense. From June 1977 to May 1980, he commanded the Submarine Force, U.S. Atlantic Fleet.

He served as Vice Director of Strategic Target Planning at Offutt Air Force Base, Nebraska, before assuming duties as Deputy and Chief of Staff to the Commander in Chief, U.S. Atlantic Command on April 1, 1983. Among his honors are the Defense and Navy Distinguished Service Medals, the Legion of Merit, Presidential Unit Commendation and the Defense Superior Service Medals. VADM Carr was appointed to the Nuclear Regulatory Commission on August 14, 1986 and served as its Chairman from July 1, 1989 until he retired in 1991.

A funeral service was held in Parkside Church, 7100 Pettibone Road, Chagrin Falls, Ohio, on Wednesday, December 2. Interment with full military honors will be in Arlington National Cemetery at a later date, to be announced.

A report from Fritz Hemrich, USS Flasher Plankowner

On Wednesday, December 2, 2015, services were held for Admiral Carr at Parkside Church in Chagrin Falls, Ohio. I estimate that there were 120-140 people in attendance at the church, and maybe 50 at a reception at South Franklin Circle where Adm. Carr lived. His service was held in a very nice, large area of the church, where he was a member and was very well liked and respected.

USS Flasher Plank Officer Capt. James Patton and I represented Flasher along with Guy Pearce, son of Plankowner Lt. Robert Pearce. Guy flew in from Seattle to pay his and his family's respects. Capt. Patton flew in from North Stonington, Conn. Others came from all over Ohio, from the Arlington area, and from Norfolk. The Cod Base of USSVI had about 8 Sub Vets there, who assisted with unfolding and placing the U.S. Flag on the casket, and later as pall bearers.

The morning of the services, I met with Capt. Patton at Adm. Carr's apartment. He brought with him articles from the Admiral's home in Groton Long Point that the Admiral was unable to return to retrieve. Adm. Carr and a nephew had gone back and brought some items back to Chagrin

Falls prior to his home being sold, but he ended up back in the hospital again before he could get back. The new owner has graciously allowed the Pace and Carr families time to store and remove these and other articles that he had.

Admiral Carr will be joining his wife Molly at Arlington National Cemetery at a future date. As soon as I receive this information from the family, I will pass it to all of you.

In closing, I would like to add this: After meeting with Capt. Patton that morning, I drove over to the church to wait. I was there fairly early, as the funeral home's hearse arrived, followed by one of the owners. She greeted me at my car because she saw my Sub Vets vest hanging in the rear side window. Shortly after that, one of the gentlemen came over and asked me if I would help remove the casket from the hearse, as they had limited help at that time. I said yes. I had the honor and privilege of bringing him into the church, then later with more of my local Sub Vets, returning him to it.

I am glad that I saved that bit of information for last, because my eyes are starting to leak...

COMMANDING OFFICER'S REPORT

It has been nearly three years since I joined the NAUTILUS family as the 16th OIC of the ship (I count CDR Wilkinson as the first OIC back in the PCU 571 days). My time here has been one of the highlights of my 15+ years in the Navy. The interaction and support I have received from Nautilus alumni has been an important part of my tour. I would like to thank the entire Nautilus family for welcoming me into the community. As my tour as OIC draws to a close (I will be relieved by LCDR Reg Preston in April), I appreciate this opportunity to reflect on some of the highlights from my time as part of the Nautilus family.

"Nautilus is different" is a truism I am fond of telling nearly everyone with whom I speak. I often use it as an opening line before describing the uniqueness of working at this one-of-a-kind ship. I suspect that all who served on "The First and Finest" understand how different she is and perhaps have a similar saying.

I did expect that maintaining a boat at least twice as old as any other sub in the fleet would be a challenge. What I did not appreciate before arriving were the unique challenges of running a museum and the variety of interactions we have with the public, the submarine community, and VIPs of every kind imaginable. Flag officers, military service members, former crew, elected leaders, large school and tour groups show up all the time, often unannounced. (**True story:** the entire local NR office was conducting a retirement dress rehearsal on the pier this summer when the Miss Connecticut Pageant unexpectedly arrived for a visit.) In short, nothing in my submarine career prepared me for many of the challenges and opportunities of serving on Nautilus today.

I was only a few months into my tour at Nautilus when

VADM Wilkinson passed away. The Admiral's passing was not only a loss to the Navy and the nation, but a turning point in my tour as OIC. The flurry of national media and "big navy" attention forced me to quickly dig into the ship's early years to better understand her place in history. The loss of such a key figure was also the direct inspiration for organizing a 60th commissioning anniversary event that I would host the following year. A fascinating cross section of Nautilus alumni attended this 60th celebration and it was one of the highlights of my time here.

While researching Nautilus history, I began to realize how little I knew about the history of the submarine force. To many of today's dolphin wearers, their knowledge of our past starts with USS HOLLAND (SS 1), then jumps to WWII submarines in the Pacific, followed by a little bit of Nautilus, Admiral Rickover, and some Cold War trivia (often from Tom Clancy novels or Blind Man's Bluff).

Additional reading, discussions with veterans, and research into our museum artifacts led to my creation of a Submarine Force history lecture that focuses on the key



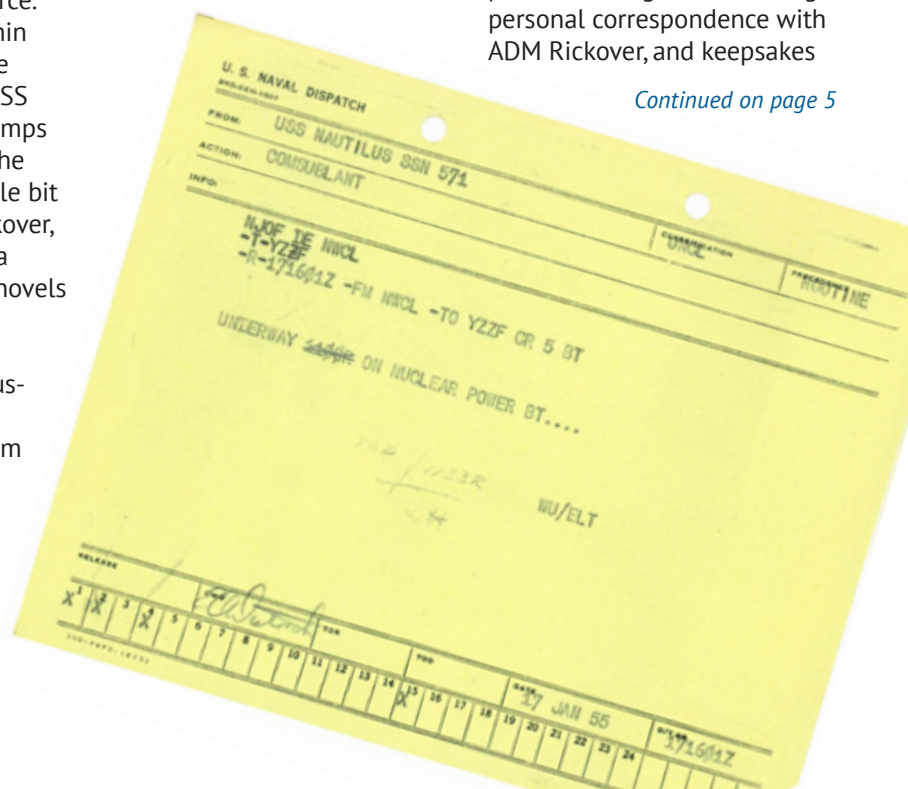

technologies, innovations, and people that shaped its history. I began giving this lecture to each submarine officer class. My hope is that the tradition of this lecture will continue and expand into the enlisted BESS classes as well.

In May 2015, the children of VADM Wilkinson invited me to the Admiral's home in Califor-

nia to assist with an incredible donation of many of his personal papers, photos, and mementos from his distinguished career. The museum staff identified some amazing and unexpected items during cataloging and preservation. Highlights include the yellow carbon copy of the January 17, 1955 "underway on nuclear power" message, entertaining personal correspondence with ADM Rickover, and keepsakes

from his long career. His personal papers give a fantastic peek inside an important period in naval history. I am sure you will enjoy a few of the items I have included with this article. We will show you more of them at the 2016 reunion in Groton.

In the past few years, the active duty crew and professional museum staff have taken renewed pride in maintaining and improving the museum and Nautilus. New museum displays include the NR-1 exhibit outside the front entrance, an Operation Sunshine exhibit in the Nautilus room, a completely renovated classroom, with more new exhibits in various stages of development. I think you will also find that the museum and ship are cleaner and fresher looking than they have been in a decade, thanks to the hard work of the crew. Many of the museum's exhibits date back to its construction in the mid-1980s and the expansion in 2000. **I extend a challenge to our alumni to invest some of their time, experience, and effort to help develop and support new and better exhibits that tell the story of their naval service.**

My three years at the museum have been among the best of my life. In addition to becoming a father, the opportunity to become part of the distinguished Nautilus family has given me greater appreciation for the history of our Navy and our Submarine Force. I have had the honor of hosting government and elected leaders, admirals, VIPs, military veterans, schoolchildren, and everyday American citizens. I have been proud to tell them the story of our ship. I have also had the unfortunate duty of recognizing the passing of too many of our Nautilus family. The loss of Admiral Carr and the opportunity to share his legacy with the current submarine force is a recent example.

Historic Ship Nautilus and the Submarine Force Museum exist as a national memorial, honoring and inspiring the service of all submariners, past, present and future. It has been my privilege to be a part of this history.

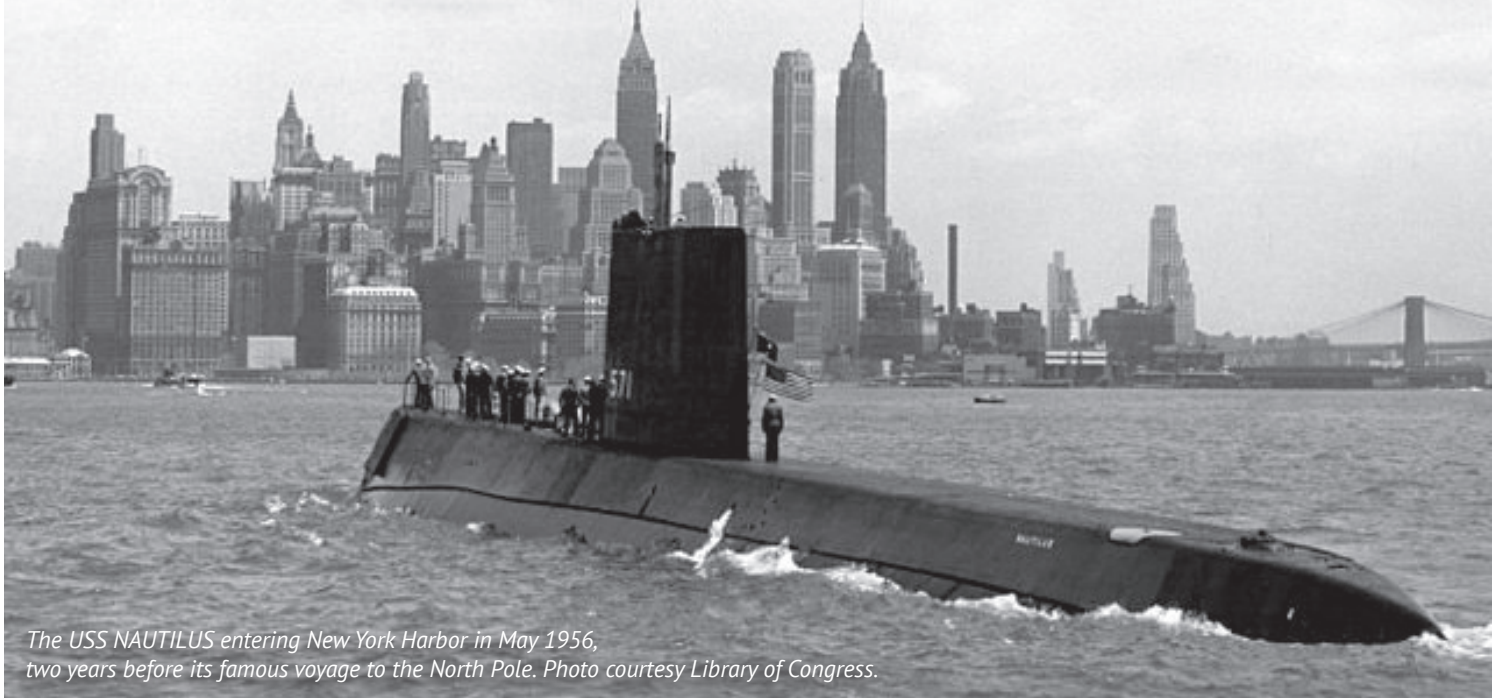

NAUTILUS STORIES

This trip into New York harbor happened in 1956 and was not related to the 1958 Polar trip, which I also participated in. In the picture, I am the sailor standing aft of the sail with the task of dipping the colors in response to flag salutes from the merchant ships moored at the piers. However, as just an E-2, I needed senior guidance to get the process correct. That guidance was provided by the “kindly old gentleman” **Admiral Rickover**. My maneu-

vering watch assignment at that time was topside watch. When we surfaced to enter the harbor, we just steamed up the harbor, reversed course and departed. No port call. I was instructed on the proper procedure for dipping the colors by Doggy Rayl, then QM1. As I was standing aft of the sail performing my assigned task, the Admiral, who had been positioned forward of the sail with the anchor detail, strolled aft and stood alongside me. His

first comment was **“Sailor, do you know what you are doing?”** I quite nervously responded that I did and explained the process as Doggy had explained it to me. As a 19-year-old E-2, and knowing the Admiral's reputation, it was a somewhat frightening experience. His only response was **“Well, don't screw it up.”** He then proceeded forward. There are some events in life you just don't forget, and that certainly was one of them!

What is the NEAF?

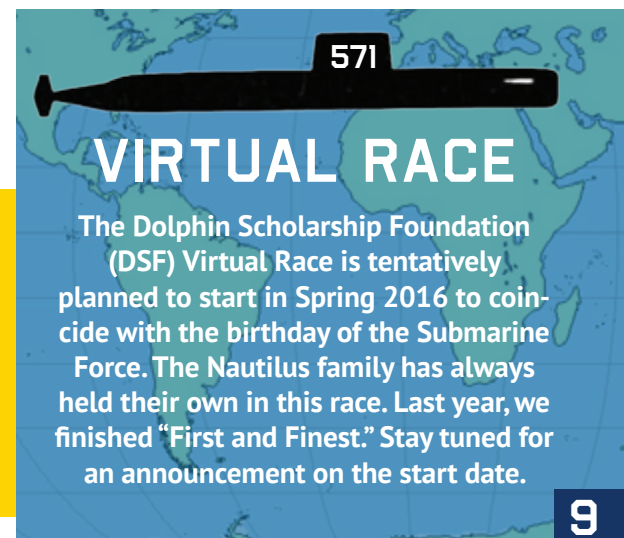
However you donate, please note that your donation is for "NEAF/Nautilus Scholarship" so the monies will be placed in the proper fund.

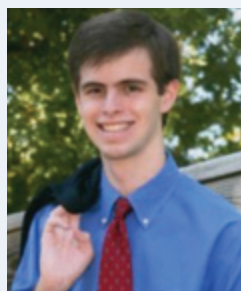

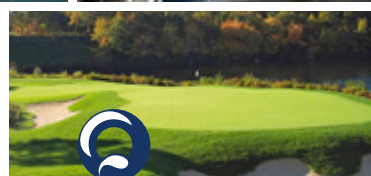
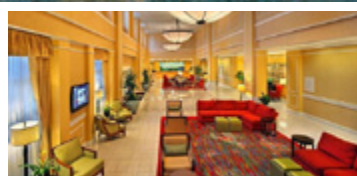
